Malaria is an illness. It is caused by tiny creatures, called parasites that live in people's blood. The malaria mosquito bites people and drinks their blood. It carries parasites from one person to another when it bites them.

What happens if you have it?

People who have malaria feel either too hot or too cold. They sweat and shake and get headaches and sore muscles. Sometimes they vomit.

Is it dangerous?

Between 1 and 2.5 million people die of malaria every year, many of them in Africa.

How do you prevent it?

You can take medicine so you don't get malaria. You can also protect yourself by sleeping under
