Adverbs

An adverb tells you more about another word in the sentence.

Adverbs answer the questions: how, when, where or how much.

slowly, fast, loudly, carefully, beautifully, well	after, before, never, today, yesterday	away, inside, everywhere, upstairs	extremely, very, really, quite, terribly

Sometimes prepositions do the work of adverbs.
 Examples:

I put the balls **inside**. (Inside is an adverb of place.) The balls flew **up**. (Up is an adverb of place.)

Simple and complex sentences

A simple sentence has one subject and one verb.

A complex sentence is made up of clauses – it has a main clause and at least one subordinate clause.

Main clause It has a subject and a verb. It makes sense on its own.	Subordinate clause It has a verb, but it does not make sense on its own.
