When reading a graph:

- First read the heading
- Bar graphs show information by using bars to represent numbers.
- There is a vertical line (waste items like apple core) and a horizontal line (the years it takes to decompose).
- The *x*-axis is a horizontal line and the *y*-axis is a vertical line, but this is for your Maths teacher.
- (x to the left and y to the sky helps you to remember which is which.)
- When something decomposes, it breaks up into smaller parts, like food that will become rotten.
- Now do no 3a)-h) in your classwork book. This is not a formal assessment.



Adjectives p.71 no 1

You already know that adjectives describe nouns.

Imagine a story book without adjectives. It would be so boring and uninteresting.

In Grade 5 you are expected to use more interesting, challenging adjectives. Instead of saying, the big building, rather use the colossal / towering / massive building

- Cheetah (you can refer to its speed or appearance. Look up better words for fast.)
- For example: The cheetah runs at **break-neck** speed.





• An Ostrich (You can refer to its neck or size. Look up better words for long or big.)







• A tortoise (You can refer to its speed – look up better words for slow)






- A gazelle (Look up better words for jumping or fast.)
- For example: The <u>vaulting</u> gazelle escapes quickly. It must be used as an adjective, not a verb. The gazelle is vaulting over the grass. (verb)





• A vulture (Look up better words for ugly.)
