In this theme:

- 2. What do the animals do for the person?
- 3. Do you think there is a good relationship between the person and the animals? Why or why not?

Listen and speak

Listen to the poem, *Talking turkeys*, by a man of Jamaican origin. It shows how Jamaicans speak English.

- 1. a) What do you think the poem may be about?
 - b) What do you think the turkeys might say about Christmas?

After you listen

- 2. Your teacher will read the poem again. Read the questions first, then listen to find the answers.
 - a) Which words in the poem tell us that the poet is Jamaican?
 - b) Does the poet use rhyme and rhythm in this poem?
 - c) What effect does rhyme and rhymth have when the poem is read aloud?
 - d) Write down two rhyming words from the poem.
- 3. Discuss and answer the following questions in groups
 - a) Why does the poet say we should be nice to turkeys?
 - b) What does he say the turkeys like doing at Christmas?
 - c) Do you agree with the poet that we should not eat turkeys? Why or why not?
 - d) Is this poem humorous or serious? What makes it funny or serious? How does this affect the listener or reader?
 - e) Does this poem make you think differently about turkeys? If so, how?

Language practice

Alliteration, assonance and consonance

Alliteration – same sounds are used at the beginning of words that are close to each other.

Example: the great green greasy Limpopo

Assonance - words with similar vowel sounds are used together.

Example: the blue moon looms

Consonance – words that end with the same consonant

sounds are used together. Example: Bold golden shield

After you read

- 1. Were you surprised by this ending? If so, why?
- Summarise the characters, setting and plot of the poem in six or fewer sentences.
- 3. Do you like this version of Red Riding Hood? Explain.
